

# **Entertainment Amidst Pandemic**

ne of the biggest industries to be hit by the coronavirus pandemic has been the entertainment industry. Last spring, when COVID-19 caused widespread shutdowns of businesses, arts and entertainment were hit hard. And unlike other industries, such as retail and food service, for the most part, the fine and performing arts have not been able to reopen or bounce back. Optimistically, with vaccines being administered at a successful rate, it may not be too far off for when museums, venues, and other performing centres can reopen. In the meantime, the entertainment industry needs to assess its path to recovery, as well as advocate for its importance both economically and culturally. Here are three insights about the current state of the entertainment industry and its economic importance. The COVID-19 pandemic created a major upheaval in the entertainment industry. Most theatres, concert halls and cinemas were shuttered for at least a year and television and film production halted for months, leading to hundreds of thousands of layoffs and large sums of money lost. Not only were those directly working in production affected but so were people that support the industry, such as caterers, florists and trucking companies.

But while the film industry has seen a number of negative effects due to the pandemic, it hasn't been all bad. Stuck-at-home consumers fuelled a tremendous increase in streaming, as noted by the staggering gains made by Netflix and Disney+, in particular, as well as a general increase in video gaming. With many movie theatres either in the process of reopening or still uncertain about the future, production companies have turned to these streaming services to debut their movie slates. One major film studio, Warner Bros. Pictures, decided to release all of its 2021 films on HBO Max. This allows for more people to stream new movies from the comfort and safety of their own homes while also prompting the question: What does the future hold for movie theatres, streaming services and film studios when the pandemic ends? Essentially cinemas will become reserved for more dedicated, niche audiences that will continue to support the theatres for years to come. As for television, the lowering of production standards via remote production practices has taken away one of television's core advantages in both domestic and transnational markets: high production values. This situation suggests we will see greater foreign competition for eyeballs as long as the international content fits within popular genres. People have become more comfortable streaming non-English language content, for example, the French mystery thriller series Lupin. The trend is likely to continue as international companies continue to produce content at a similar quality or even higher quality than the content entertainment companies are creating. Regardless of what the future holds for the entertainment industry, USC experts believe these shifts will have a long-lasting effect on culture and media.

The COVID-19 pandemic has been an unprecedented health crisis. It has had a drastic impact on every facet of the worldwide economy, including the media and entertainment industry. Lockdowns in countries with high caseloads have seen cinemas and movie theatres close. Those that remain open are operating at partial capacity due to social distancing measures. This has all led to the entertainment taking extraordinary measures such as major films like Trolls: World Tour and Mulan being released via streaming platforms while others such as the James Bond film No Time to Die's release has been postponed until April 2021. Meanwhile, other films have seen their production and release dates postponed indefinitely. Even major industry events have either been delayed, cancelled, or had their format changed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.



# US calls for safe resettlement of Afghan refugees

he US State Department has urged Pakistan to prioritise the safety and efficient resettlement

of Afghan refugees and asylum seekers.

The call comes amid concerns that hasty or unscrupulous deportations could pose a significant risk to the lives of these vulnerable individuals.

"Our key concern is the safety of vulnerable and at-risk individuals," State Department spokesperson Matthew Miller said at a Tuesday afternoon news briefing.

Highlighting the shared responsibility in addressing the plight of refugees, he emphasised the need for collaborative efforts to navigate the complexities of resettlement.

"We believe it is in both our countries"

interest to ensure the safe and efficient resettlement of refugees and asylum seekers."

Miller said, "We join all of our partners in urging all countries, including Pakistan, to uphold their

respective obligations in the treatment of refugees and asylum seekers. We strongly encourage all of Afghanistan's neighbours to allow entry for Afghans seeking international protection and coordinate with international humanitarian organisations to provide assistance."

As the situation evolves, the diplomatic engagement between the US and Pakistan takes centre stage

in addressing the challenges associated with the resettlement process.

## Pakistani teacher wins **Global Teacher Prize 2023**

ister Zeph, a Pakistani teacher who established a school for underprivileged children at the age of 13, has won the Varkey Foundation Global Teacher Prize 2023. The \$1 million award, the largest of its kind, was presented to her in collaboration with UNESCO and Dubai Cares.

Sister Zeph, chosen from over 7,000 nominees worldwide, has dedicated 26 years to providing free education to more than 200 children.

The award ceremony, hosted by Stephen Fry, featured speakers like Nile

Rodgers and highlighted the UNESCO and Teacher Taskforce Global Report on Teachers, emphasizing the need for 44 million additional teachers globally by 2030. Sister Zeph plans to use the prize funds to build a school for underprivileged children and create a shelter for orphans.

The event also recognized the top 10 finalists for the Global Student Prize 2023. The Global Teacher Prize aims to celebrate exceptional teachers and acknowledge their critical role in society. S



he Gilgit-Baltistan Supreme Appellate Court (SAC) has directed the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) and Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) to submit a report on the operational life of ATR aircraft on the Gilgit-Islamabad route and the reasons behind technical faults in these flights.

The people of GB pleaded that the operational life of PIA's ATR planes had expired, posing an extreme risk.

## Hasina's daughter takes WHO top job, rejects criticism

he World Health Organisation on Wednesday selected the daughter of Bangladesh's prime minister to be its South-East Asia director, a month after she rejected criticisms of nepotism over her application.

Saima Wazed, 49, daughter of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, was accused of using her mother's clout to get nominated to the position, allegations she has denied.

"I look forward to building a healthier South-East Asia,"

Wazed posted on X, formerly Twitter, after being selected for the post heading an 11-nation region home to a quarter of the world's population.



akistan has applied for BRICS membership, according to the Foreign Office (FO).


In her weekly presser, FO Spokesperson Mumtaz Zahra Baloch confirmed Pakistan's decision, saying that the country hopes BRICS will move forward with its application.



"We have decided after having noted the BRICS-related developments in Johannesburg," she said. Baloch added that Pakistan enjoys friendly ties with most members of the BRICS and the newly invited group of countries.

"Pakistan is an ardent supporter of multilateralism and a member of several multilateral organizations. The country has played an important role in global peace and development," she added.

In August, BRICS - Brazil, Russia, India, China, and South Africa - invited six countries - Argentina, Egypt, Iran, Ethiopia, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates - to become new bloc members. At the time, Baloch had said that Pakistan did not make any formal request to join the group.

### THE DAWN OF THE PLANET OF THE APES

## **WAR BEGETS WAR**

n 1968, a science-fiction film 'The Planet of the Apes' was released. Based on the book written by Pierre Boulle (1912-1994), this film was about an astronaut who landed on a foreign planet where apes enslaved humans. Following a big plot twist, four more

sequels of the film were made, each with a rather lacklustre storyline and were more plot-driven than by the protagonist's internal conflicts.

The film 'The Dawn of the Planet of the Apes commences in a dystopian, postapocalyptic world, with human civilization on the precipice of extinction as the ALZ-113 pandemic forces the planet Earth into a strict lockdown. Ten years have passed since the beginning of the lockdown, and humans

have now been immunized against the virus. The cold colour palette of the film perfectly reflects its dark, gloomy atmosphere. The film is significantly relatable to audiences who have suffered from the COVID-19 pandemic and the ensuing lockdown. Only a handful of humanpopulated pockets have survived on Earth. Near the woods where the apes have taken refuge is a village utterly devoid of electricity.

The apes, meanwhile, have formed a sort of tribal system, with Caesar as the head. Two of Caesar's closest companions are an orangutan called Maurice and a bonobo called Koba. Koba and Caesar possess very different personalities. While Caesar

is more calm and collected, Koba lets his emotions take the wheel. Caesar is a chimpanzee, and Koba is a bonobo. Bonobos are docile and harmless, and chimpanzees are known to be aggressive and violent. This, however, does not reflect off of these two characters. Caesar has a soft spot for humans, whereas Koba

Dreyfus sends Malcolm and a few others to go and take an overview of the situation in the tribe of the apes and perhaps convince them to let both civilizations gain access to the dam. In the woods, Malcolm and

he begins to expose his true colours.

Filled with a burgeoning hatred towards humans and sympathetic apes, Koba indulges in ruthless murder, sparing apes due to the "Ape does not kill ape" law. His sole mission is to obliterate the human race. Despite an intriguing turn of events, Koba meets his demise, revealing the hypocrisy embedded in his personality. The film intricately weaves themes of friendship, betrayal, revenge, and forgiveness, portraying a cinematic end. With outstanding performances, particularly from Andy Serkis, the film communicates its message effectively through minimal dialogue. S
